History

The Historical Archives of the Chamber of Deputies were established in 1848, less than a month after the first sitting of the Chamber of the Kingdom of Sardinia, when an official Librarian-Archivist was appointed.

The Archives were later separated from the Library of the Chamber and attached to the Offices of the General Secretariat of the Chamber of Deputies: they changed their location as the seat of government in the Kingdom of Italy moved from Turin to Florence and finally to Rome.

In the post-WW2 period, the archival section consisting of the originals of the institutional documents produced and acquired by the Chamber of Deputies gradually became a separate and autonomous entity as distinct from the archive of current records, i.e. the reports of proceedings and documents produced during the ongoing parliamentary term.



Under Law No. 147 of 3rd February 1971, the Historical Archives of both Houses of Parliament were formally established with a well-defined institutional status, in keeping with the principle of constitutional autonomy of the Houses enshrined in the Constitution of 1948.

Specific "Rules of the Historical Archives" and "Rules for the Admission of the Public to the Historical Archives" regulate their organisation and functioning. Since 1982, the Historical Archives have been housed in Palazzo San Macuto.



Functions

The Historical Archives acquire, catalogue, preserve and restore documents produced or acquired by the Chamber of Deputies in the exercise of its institutional functions. It may also acquire private holdings, collections and memorabilia relating to political and parliamentary history.

The Archives provide assistance to MPs, Chamber of Deputies staff and external users that wish to consult its holdings.

They promote study and research activities, nationally and internationally, pertaining to the archival resources of the Chamber of Deputies and related publications (e.g. documentation dossiers; collections of essays; records relating to parliamentary history), as well as educational initiatives, study visits and documentary exhibitions.

The Archives participate in the declassification of documents that have been generated or acquired by parliamentary committees of inquiry and submitted to the archives for safekeeping, upon the conclusion of the committee work.

They are responsible for updating their own website: archivio.camera.it through electronic inventories and records. They also contribute documentary materials to the History Portal of the Chamber of Deputies:
